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Some reflections on the Prayer of the Church

The most common objection people have to the Latin Mass is that they cannot understand the language. It is true that our Lord taught us to address God as Father (though the term he used "Abba" would be much more intimate, closer to "Daddy") but when he prayed and read the scriptures in the synagogue as we know he did from the gospels, he did so in classical Hebrew which by the time of Christ was not spoken. There were translations and commentaries available, called the Targums, but the average Jew in the synagogue was not hearing the prayers in the vernacular.

These prayers would have been chanted in a manner similar to the way the psalms are chanted today, although the tones were a good deal more complex than what we have in the Roman rite.

An interesting reflection which sheds a great deal of light on why a language that is not in common use is best for public worship was made in passing by Joseph Jungmann in his magnum opus *Missarum Sollemnia*:

"Speech-song or *accentus* is the method most suited to liturgical prayer said aloud. It avoids two extremes; on the one hand that passionate speech whose modulation, directed entirely by emotion and mood, seems alien to a prayer which was not formulated by the speaker, and which at any rate gives the personal and individual element too much play; on the other hand the monotony of the severe *tonus rectus*, unbroken by any cadence whatever, which does not suit at least the more festive prayer assemblies."

The point that the author makes in passing we would do well to consider: the personal and individual element should have little to no place in the celebration of public worship. Some priests have a great facility with the Latin language, but few would have the audacity to extemporize prayers.

And not only are the words used not to be improvised, but even the liturgical gestures are not subject to the whims of the celebrant. Already in the first centuries of the church, priests were being warned not to exaggerate their gestures in the course of the liturgy. This reflection by Canon J. B. O'Connell in his manual for priests "The Celebration of Mass" is particularly enlightening:

"That the actions of Mass may be performed with the greatest reverence, propriety, and dignity, the rubrics regulate in detail the posture, movements, and gestures of the Celebrant. The general principle underlying these minute directions seems to be, not merely that the priest should act efficiently, decorously, and reverently, but also that when he stands at the altar as the representative of Christ he should lay aside, as far as possible, all individual peculiarities,

and even the smallest idiosyncrasy, exaggeration, or affectation which might attract attention to himself, and withdraw it from the great Act in which he is engaged. Hence the rubrics concerning the position of the Celebrant's hands, the movements of his eyes, and the various liturgical gestures, aim at eliminating not only what savours of irreverence, indifference, or carelessness, but also all mannerisms or extravagances even of an apparently "pious" character. The rubrics keep the priest's movement, his looks, and his voice, within due bounds - they are laws of restraint. They are rules which aid the priest's personal sanctification, as they constitute a very real spiritual discipline. It is no small act of self-training and self-control, day after day, for example, to genuflect quite erect, or to hold one's outstretched hands parallel to one another and not extended beyond the width of the shoulders, as the rubrics require."
