EASTER DUTY

From the Code of Canon Law:

Can. 920 §1. After being initiated into the Most Holy Eucharist, each of the faithful is obliged to receive holy communion at least once a year.

§2. This precept must be fulfilled during the Easter season unless it is fulfilled for a just cause at another time during the year.

Can. 989 After having reached the age of discretion, each member of the faithful is obliged to confess faithfully his or her grave sins at least once a year.

In the United States, the "Easter season" is taken to mean any time from the first Sunday of Lent all the way to Trinity Sunday.

If any children wish to make their first Communion during this Easter season, their parents are asked to contact the pastor as soon as possible.

ASCENSION THURSDAY

There will be a high Mass at 7:00 PM this Thursday, May 10, to celebrate the feast of Our Lord's Ascension into heaven. Although the obligation to assist at Mass has been eliminated in this diocese, the importance of this feast cannot be overstated.

HELP NEEDED

With the departure of the parish secretary, a volunteer is needed on Monday mornings to process the collection. This involves entering the donation amounts into the parish computer and preparing the deposits. This task typically takes no more than an hour. This is one of those many things that the pastor "can" do but ought not do for liability purposes (this includes things such as counting the collection). A list of items in high demand has been compiled by the Women's Care Center representatives. These collected items will be allocated according to their guidelines and needs.

Why Does Human Life Matter?

Society clearly operates on the premise that there is something special, unique and noble in being human. Indeed, we all seem to have an innate conviction that life does matter.

If you think about it, this is surprising for those who do not believe in God and believe that we are all just random accidents, whose life is not a result of thought or design, but rather of blind chance. Although the secular, humanist view has no answer for why human life matters and is unable to explain why life matters, atheists and agnostics nevertheless live their lives on the assumption that it does and that there is a reason for their being. This is surprising because one cannot have it both ways. Either God made us and assigned a special value to us, or God did not make us and human life would appear to be both worthless and meaningless.

Conversely, Christians can easily explain why life matters.
