

Active registered parishioners should contact the Pastor at least six Months in advance of the date.




MASS REQUESTS

Triduum Schedule




Holy Thursday

6:00 pm Solemn Mass, Procession to the Altar of Repose, Vespers, Stripping of the Altar

- Tenebrae of Good Friday
- Adoration at the Altar of Repose until midnght
- Confessions will be available after Tenebrae until there are no penitents

The Solemn Mass of Holy Thursday should run around an hour and a half. Vespers is sung in plain chant and without ceremony. At approximately 8pm, Tenebrae will start in a bare and empty Sanctuary and will last almost two hours. Tenebrae is composed of Matins and Lauds for Good Friday and is the ancient vigil prayer of the Church. One may adore at the Altar of Repose or sit in the pews and follow along.



Good Friday

3:00 pm Solemn Singing of the Passion, Adoration of the Cross, Solemn Mass of the Presanctified, Vespers

• Confessions will be available after Vespers until there are no penitents

The mass of the Presanctified is the second part of Holy Thursday. The Eucharist consecrated the night before is brought from the Altar of Repose and consumed today with a piece of this host ritually sacrificed in a chalice of wine. There is no mass or communion service. This is how the ancient liturgy ritually links the Last Supper with Christ's crucifixion; they are one sacrifice. The absence of a communion service leaves the Church with a total absence of Christ—the reality of how much was sacrificed on our behalf.



Holy Saturday

6:00 pm Solemn Mass of Easter Vigil, Vespers

The Solemn Mass of the Easter Vigil is the longest service in the Liturgical year, around three hours. It commences with the restoration of light by means of the Easter candle, a symbol of hope and the resurrection while Christ is hidden in the tomb. The singing of the Exsultant and the following twelve lessons from the Old Testament form the main instruction of how, since the beginning of the world through salvation history, God will redeem and deliver His people from destruciton. After the Lessons, the Baptismal water is made, from which all baptisms throughout the year will be performed. A typical Solemn Mass concludes the entire ceremony—the Eucharist being the source and summit of all the Sacraments.
